

Voice Lessons: The Next Frontier

Triad Music Academy is now offering voice lessons! We will feature our new <u>Lead Voice Instructor, Laura</u> <u>Carisa Gardea</u>, in next month's newsletter, but I wanted to use this month's issue to discuss our vision for voice lessons.

The first question is: how did we land on voice for our second instrument after the piano? There are a few reasons, the first being that singing and piano pair together quite well. The human voice accompanied by the piano is a combination you can find in a litany of different musical styles. Jazz, classical, pop, country, and worship music are just a few prominent examples.

Secondly, it was really important to me that we chose an instrument with which I was familiar. I am by no means qualified to teach voice lessons myself, but I did take some choir and vocal studies classes from high school through undergrad and my master's. All this is to say that we can maintain the same quality and breadth of programming with voice that we've had with the piano. Thirdly, when looking for an instructor for another instrument, I wanted someone who was knowledgeable, professional, and a great fit to work with our students. Laura has been all that and more! In fact, she has already written her first lesson for the student portal, entitled "<u>Vocal Hygiene: Caring for Your</u> <u>Instrument</u>."

This brings me to my next point: TMA has found success by offering our students a clear path to long term musical skill development via our four pillar offer:

- **1. Weekly Lessons**
- 2. Recitals & Masterclasses
- **3. Online Supplemental Lessons**

New Piano Instructor: Eric Schwartz

Eric further diversifies our roster of piano instructors with his triple background as a pianist, composer, and music educator. While his original music has been published and recorded in both the US and the UK and even performed in Australia, the bulk of Eric's professional background has come in the form of dance accompaniment.

Eric has served as the Music Director at the School of Dance of the UNC School of the Arts since 2011. He has held previous dance accompanying positions at the following institutions:

- Wake Forest University
- Hunter College
- New York University
- Adelphi University

As a seasoned music educator, Eric has plenty of teaching experience. He currently teaches courses at Wake Forest University and Davidson County Community College.



Additionally, Eric maintained his own private piano studio in New York City for nine years before coming to Winston-Salem.

Beyond his teaching experience and musical credentials, I was personally impressed with Eric's non-dogmatic approach to teaching the piano and music education, in general. I think he will shine in particular as a fit with adult students and older children. Eric self-described his teaching approach like so:

"To my mind, the single most important thing in the teaching and learning of music is joy. I want my students to learn to love playing the piano, and to love making and learning about music more generally."

For those who don't know, it is actually fairly rare within the field of piano education for a teacher to have studied in a formalized, academic music education program. Eric and I discussed many facets of piano teaching, and I think his greatest strength lies in his willingness to help students achieve their own goals, rather than predetermining the entire piano lesson experience from a cookie-cutter perspective. Of course, Eric and I also discussed piano technique and tension-free playing, which is a priority for our entire teaching team. Eric and I connected in that we have both recovered from poor piano technique in the past to lead successful pianoplaying lives.

With his unique background and the dynamic mock piano lesson that Eric taught me, I am convinced he will mesh well with transfer students who come into TMA looking for another teacher's piano approach.

Finally, all new TMA instructors must pass State, Federal, and National Sex Offender Registry background checks in order to be welcomed onto the team. It is my priority to ensure your student's safety and wellbeing as they pursue their lifelong piano playing journey with TMA.


