### What is Your Student Learning?

Being a former public school music teacher, I understand how important it is that parents know what their children are learning. This month, I'd like to briefly cover the curricula I use with piano students.

In the world of piano teaching, there are three major levels of skill progression: elementary, intermediate, and advanced. Each of these can be further divided into early, middle, and late. Piano method books typically carry students from their first lesson into the early- or middle-intermediate levels. Late-intermediate and advanced students typically play standard piano repertoire rather than following a method book.

Generally speaking, there are four types of piano method books. Each method is defined by the way that it introduces note reading and hand placement at the beginning of a student's piano journey. Intervallic piano method books introduce note reading by focusing on the distance between notes. These method books start on the black keys and gradually move around the keyboard. If your student uses The Music Tree, they are learning from an intervallic book.

I find The Music Tree to be a great fit for students ages 7 and below. The modified note reading at the beginning of this series makes it manageable for younger students who are often learning how to read music at the same time they learn to read English. Additionally, the first book does not use the thumb or pinky, which makes the music more adaptable for smaller, developing hands.

Middle C method books are based around placing the right thumb on Middle C, and the left hand typically on the B next to it. If your student uses Faber Piano Adventures, they are learning from a Middle C method book.



### What is Your Student Learning?, Cont.

In my experience, the Piano
Adventures books are great for
engaging students ages 11 and above
because they can play music that
they recognize early on in their
studies. To be even more specific, I
use the editions of this series written
for older children and for adults.

Multikey method books are tonally-based, meaning that they are built around playing in different keys for different pieces of music. I do not currently teach out of any true multikey piano method books.

However, I do use The Russian School of Piano Playing as a supplement with some students. This book is not technically multikey, but it is very similar to multikey method books.

Lastly, some method books fall under the umbrella term of being "eclectic," which means they are influenced by at least two of the previouslymentioned method book categories. Naturally, there are many different ways this can look. The eclectic book I use is called Piano Safari. It starts out very similarly to an intervallic book, but quickly turns into a sort of hybrid between Middle C and multikey. The modified reading introduction has faster pacing than a fully intervallic book, but slower pacing than a Middle C book. This combination places Piano Safari in a unique position to serve students ages 8-10.

Of course, it must be said that not every student fits neatly with every method book. Some students work well with a book outside of their typical age categories. Other students have transferred into Triad Music Academy from other studios with different books. There are also advanced students who learn best with standard piano repertoire in place of method books.
